#### A New and Charismatic look at our Lenten Practices

When we think of Lent we often think of things penitential, of solemn music, and of denying ourselves. All this is part of Lent but for us it often becomes the dominant theme, and so we can miss much of what is also part of Lent. The focus of Lent is baptism, which is new life in Christ. And with baptism comes the Holy Spirit. Immediately after Jesus is baptized the Holy Spirit comes upon him and he then prepares himself, in the wilderness, for his public ministry.

The three traditional Lenten practices have been prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. The practice of fasting is often the more dominant aspect of our understanding of Lent. This represents all ascetical practices, and we see it in our notion of giving something up for Lent, of making a sacrifice. This is essentially a religious take of our earthly practice of cleaning up our homes so as to make them more livable and welcoming to guests. We are encouraged to examine our lives and to deal with the things that lead to the spiritual versions of clutter, dirt, things needing repair and cleaning, and even some renovation or removal. These all help us to refocus on what is spiritually important and essential for our lives. From a charismatic perspective, we want our hearts and lives to be more open to and welcoming of the Holy Spirit. Perhaps there are some things the Lord has put on our heart that need to be dealt with. And perhaps that will involve some commitment from us, and inviting the Holy Spirit more deeply into those aspects of our lives. The Hispanics have a saying, "mi casa es su casa" which literally means "my house is your house." That's how we want to approach the Lord and be welcoming of the Spirit in our lives.

Usually we see prayer in the form additional devotional practices such as Stations of the Cross, special Reconciliation services, and extra prayer options. However, prayer is our relationship with God, our friendship with God. In any friendship, that relationship develops through time spent with another, getting to know them better, and loving what they love. The same is true of our relationship with God. It grows and deepens through in these ways, and is damaged in a similar fashion to our earthly relationships. That damage is usually sin. When we damage our earthly relationships we usually apologize, make good what we did or said, and move on together. This is also what we do with God, through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We have this sacrament, not because we are so bad, but because God loves us so much. We can also strengthen our prayer life this Lent, perhaps by praying

regularly every day, perhaps by praying a little longer and more deeply, and by greater use the spiritual gifts during our prayer. When we get a word from the Lord, write it down, reflect on it, pray about it, and let the Lord move our heart and spirit. We can also use scripture to focus our prayer, perhaps taking a Gospel and reading it from the perspective of growing in understanding of Jesus as a friend.

Finally, we have the discipline of almsgiving, which is usually seen as giving money to the poor in some form. The heart of this Lenten practice much more than giving money. It is really about growing in generosity of heart and of service in every way. We are challenged to look beyond ourselves, our own desires and wants, and to see those of others and to respond to them in some way. The purpose is to help us become less selfish and more selfless, in other words to love as Jesus loved and serve as he served. We can volunteer to help at our local prayer meeting in new ways. We can support our days of renewal, retreats, and other evangelistic events in ways we haven't done before. We can give extra time and energy in prayer praying for the needs of others and for the spread of the baptism in the Holy Spirit. God has blessed us in many ways, we need to bless others.

So let us make this Lent a season of transformation for ourselves, of growing in our relationship with the Lord, of serving as he did, and in seeking to grow in holiness as he calls us to..

## "The New Man We Are Called to Become"

Pope Benedict, Audience 12/10/08

At this audience Pope Benedict had some important things to say about the Holy Spirit and new life. Here are some edited portions of his comments.

Human history, in fact, has two "beginnings," the first is "tainted by the abuse of freedom. But there exists "a second beginning of history, in Jesus Christ.

"We are linked to the first humanity through biological descent," but "how is the new humanity

realized, how does Jesus enter my life?"

St. Paul says that this takes place through the **Holy Spirit**. In the first place, "the Spirit knocks at the door of my heart, but in order that he may truly unite us, in order that he may overcome divisions and gather together those who are different, two elements are necessary, the word and proclamation, and the sacraments."

"St. Paul says, how can we call upon Jesus without having heard about him, without anyone to proclaim him, and how will they proclaim if they have not been sent?" Faith "comes from hearing, it is not a product of our mind, it is a product of proclamation, of listening, it is not only an interior journey, but a relationship, it presupposes an encounter between the proclamation and the other, it presupposes the existence of the other who proclaims and creates communion. And the one who proclaims is sent, he is part of a structure of mission that begins with Jesus, sent by the Father, and continues with the apostles and with the Church."

In other words the Holy Father reminds us of the mission we have from Christ, and of which we are empowered by the Holy Spirit, to proclaim the Gospel and Christ himself. The Apostles and disciples were charged with continuing the mission of Jesus. That means us! The Acts of the Apostles is the story of this beginning. And we are called to continue writing that story today, with our words, actions, and lives.
